A Note about the Music:

The choral mass setting and postlude this morning take us to the High Renaissance in Spain. The mass setting by Victoria anticipates the Feast of the Ascension which is celebrated 40 days after Easter, thus always falling on a Thursday. Victoria was the most famous composer in 16th-century Spain, and was one of the most important composers of the Counter-Reformation, along with Palestrina and Orlando di Lasso. Victoria was not only a composer, but also an accomplished organist and singer as well as a Catholic priest. Antonio Valente (postlude) was an organist and composer who was blind from childhood and served as organist of Sant'Angelo a Nilo in Naples in 1565–80. Naples while today part of Italy, in the 1560's was the largest and best fortified city in the Spanish empire. The Spanish pipe organ from that time did not have a pedal board, but rather the ability to split a single keyboard into different divisions.

The motet by the Welsh composer Paul Meallor, was composed for the wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton. Our choir had the honour of singing the Canadian premier in Sept of 2011 by special permission of the composer.
