On September 30th we will celebrate the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels with Archbishop Colin Johnson and the rite of Confirmation. Four parishioners are renewing their baptismal vows and thus their commitment to Jesus Christ with the ancient ritual of laying-on of hands. Our prayers are with Marina Caytap, Steven Ketola, Rees Pepperell and Brooke Sales-Lee as they take this important step in their Christian life. This is Archbishop Colin's last official visit to our parish as Diocesan Bishop before he retires at the end of the year, especially poignant since his curacy took place at St. Simon's under Canon David Crane. Our prayers and best wishes are with him and Ellen as they move into retirement and no doubt a new phase in ministry. I also ask you to pray for Bishop Elect The Very Reverend Andrew Asbil, who will be consecrated on September 29th and will assume the role of Diocesan on January 1st.

On Wednesday, October 10th at 11 am we will be hosting a Seniors' Eucharist and Luncheon. Our homebound parishioners take an active interest in parish life and enjoy visits from the clergy and Pastoral Care group. This is a chance to do a little more, to get them to the church for a service with music, followed by a lunch. We are in need of drivers who are willing to help with transportation. Please speak with me, the Reverend Jennifer Matthews or Marie Samuels-Isaac if you are able to help with this important ministry. Stewardship has been identified repeatedly as a priority for our parish and it is encouraging that "Growing Healthy Stewards" is now well underway. What is a steward? One who is a caretaker of things entrusted to him or her. We are caretakers of the gifts God has entrusted to us. What is a healthy steward? One who gives thanks for the time, talent and treasure entrusted to them. We give thanks by nurturing these gifts both in

All of this takes energy, sacrifice and a sense of purpose for the future. The hummingbirds are getting ready for the next stage in their life, one that is challenging yet full of new possibilities. Maybe they too can hear a line from the familiar hymn, "How Firm a Foundation?" One verse begins this way with the voice of God assuring the supplicant: "When through fiery trials thy pathway shall lie, my grace all sufficient shall be thy supply." May the grace of Christ continue to enliven and sustain the people of God who worship here and those who come through our doors for many reasons each and every day. *Geoffrey*+



Wardens' Report

We hope everyone had a good summer and enjoyed all the warm weather.

If you ever have a chance to visit Amherst, Nova Scotia, St. Stephen's

United Church, downtown, boasts a carillon which prior to striking the noon hour plays a familiar hymn on the bells. The Faulkner family and I spend the summer on Amherst Shore close to the town of Amherst. Perhaps we can dream of having a carillon at St. Peter and St. Simon's!

Here at St. Peter and St. Simon's, it promises to be a busy fall: Caribbean night is on Saturday, September 15th; the Cabbagetown/St. Jamestown festival is on Saturday, September 8th – if you are able, volunteers are needed to assist; as part of Stewardship, the Ministry Fair, Sunday, September 23rd; the Archbishop's visit with confirmations is on Sunday, September 30th; the shelter will hold its annual fundraiser in the parish hall on Thursday, October 11th; again, as part of Stewardship, the Joyful Giving Program, Sunday, October 21st; and patronal service and dinner Sunday, November 4th. Elsewhere in this newsletter, other contributors will also indicate dates for your information.

Fridge notes have been reformatted into a more user friendly form. And we have commenced a new content item indicating our weekly givings. It costs on average \$1500 a day to operate the church.

On Friday, July 13, the Toronto Star carried an article on bicycle lanes on Bloor street west of Sherbourne. The article noted that plans were being delayed on the implementation of wider bike lanes and sidewalks until at least 2021 pending another look by the city planning department and input from the community. Nothing was mentioned about bike lanes and sidewalks east of Sherbourne, but reading between the lines this may allow the church to have input so that parking is retained on Bloor Street between Sherbourne and Parliament.

Many thanks to Larry Krotz for organzing Doors Open for which Joy Quan Lee does the scheduling. The public is afforded the opportunity to visit the church, and volunteers are able to assist by answering any questions.

Thanks once again to Frank who was able to secure a new tenant for the office off the parish hall recently vacated by Scott. The new tenant will be teaching piano out of this space and will be moving in his own grand piano for his lessons.

Frank, working with Daiv and Sileen will be painting the new Sunday school room – the homework club space – so that it is freshen up for all the children, both Sunday School and Homework club.

The Sunday school under Sileen Phillips direction is up and running and she decided to run it through the months of July and August with considerable success. She still is in need of assistance, so if you are able to assist, please speak to her.

It was another successful summer choir season. Thanks to all who participated. We look forward to the return of the full choir on Sunday, September 16th.

I noticed on recent visits to the church that the drop-in, run by Ryerson, has had to limit spaces to parents and children; obviously there is a need for more space (and supervisors) for this type of use.

The tree from the Bloor Street side of the church has been removed. Perhaps it is time to think of a replacement.

In keeping with the results of the last fire marshal's inspection, we have begun the process of removing the material in the organ pump room, archiving a fair bit. Thanks to David McPherson for taking care of this. Also begun is the process of cleaning out all the paper in the photo-copy room as per the fire marshal's concerns.

The church's web page is up and running. If you haven't already done so, please take a look at it. Any comments are appreciated. You can do this

by writing them out and placing them on the collection plate and we will address concerns. Your positive feedback is always appreciated.

Work continues on electronic signage. We decided on a second opinion/quote and are evaluating the two offers. We will continue to keep you informed.

The broken stained glass windows in the Narthex have been repaired. We thank the shelter for kindly agreeing to pay the cost of this repair.

It has been decided to use recent bequests to the church to continue the restoration work in the sanctuary initially began as part of Our Faith Our Hope (Our Faith Our Hope is a diocesan fundraising initiative through which parishes can access some funds.) Colin Bird has kindly agreed to oversee this work.

It has also been decided to use some of the bequest received post amalgamation from a former St. Peter's parishioner, Isobel Allen, to install a new stained glass window in the north east corner of the church near the doorway to the chapel and exit from the church, commemorating the joining of the two parishes. This would be in memory of Isobel. Spencer Higgins has agreed to coordinate this work with assistance from a small group of former St Peter's parishioners.

It has also been decided to replace the front door. Many parishioners are finding it both cumbersome and heavy to open. It is proposed to go with a lighter door both in weight and colour and probably one with some sort of glass in it. The door would be easier to use by people with disabilities.

We are going to process a funding application to Our Faith Our Hope to help off-set some of the costs associated with activities noted above.

We look forward to seeing you all soon.

On Tuesdays and Thursdays throughout the summer the church doors on both Howard Street and Bloor were opened wide with a welcoming sign placed on

both sidewalks announcing our eagerness to have visitors. Willing volunteers, stationed inside, kept a watchful eye, welcomed anybody who came through, handed out leaflets about our church, and answered questions. Many thanks to these volunteers for their patience and their faithfulness.

The principle of an open doors church is an historic and important one for those seeking refuge or an hour of peace. Or in our case, simply wanting to appreciate the beauties of our sanctuary. For St. Peter and St. Simon, it also upholds a tradition practiced at St. Peter's Carlton Street for many years. For our combined parish, if we adopt the practice on a full time basis, it will also address two things: One is our mission which in substantial part is to our neighbourhood — providing the hub and the haven, the church on the village green in the midst of the dense city.

Likewise it keeps in mind how our future sustainability depends on this neighbourhood in turn embracing and supporting us. We may be a couple of years early on the open doors. Howard Street this summer had more dusty dump trucks hauling from the construction sites than pedestrians strolling to the local shops. But in a couple of years, when things have settled down and those new condos are up and filled with people, one believes we must truly be ready to have our doors open to this new neighbourhood.


Silent Night. The musical was written by Eric Rainwater and Fred Judkins.

Out of AfricaDiane Marshall



During May, I was privileged to travel to Africa with the father and partner of my god-daughter, Julia, who works for the European Union in Zambia developing programs in

women's and children's health alongside her Zambian colleagues. We spent nearly 2 weeks travelling throughout Zambia, visiting Victoria Falls in the southwest, and the Lower Zambezi River in the east. Included was a thrilling 4 days in Chombe Reserve in Botswana where we camped (with a guide!) and saw lions, elephants, zebras, giraffes, antelopes, Cape buffalo, baboons, and hippos at very close range. An experience of animals in the wild I had never imagined to be possible for myself.

After visiting the profoundly moving Apartheid Museum in Johannesburg, and meeting Suzette Mafuna's wonderful son, Khotso (who took us to Soweto for dinner), we travelled in South Africa to Cape Town, where we had been invited to tea with Archbishop and Mrs. Tutu. At the last minute, he emailed to say that he was being called to be with a dying fellow South African bishop who had also been imprisoned under apartheid, and so he arranged for us to visit the Leah and Desmond Tutu Foundation in Cape Town and to have a tour with his personal assistant and the director of the foundation. There, I presented to be taken to the Tutus, the gifts sent from Bishop Mark MacDonald on behalf of the Anglican Indigenous Ministry in Canada, seen in the photo and in the peace garden. The Foundation will be used for workshops and seminars on peace and reconciliation, and as an outreach to young people to develop life skills. The visit then to Robben Island had special meaning as we had all read Nelson Mandela's "A Long Walk to Freedom", and seeing the cell and compound where he was imprisoned for 27 years, and from which he emerged as a world leader committed to justice and peace and racial harmony, was a remarkable experience.

En route home, we flew to Addis Ababa, and spent a week exploring the ancient Coptic Ethiopian countryside, visiting churches and the national museum with the relics of Lucy, the first known hominid, and from which anthropologists trace our human heritage. Coming back to Canada, following the journey of meeting four very different cultures and peoples of Africa, was a humbling experience in recognizing our freedoms and privilege in this city and nation.

I'm Still Here!

I'm so happy that my acting group, ACT II Studio, which offers classes to people 50+ and presents productions at Ryerson University, will be presenting a research-based

drama on living with dementia at our church on Saturday, October 13 at 3:00 PM.

I'm Still Here! Is a 50-minute play that illuminates the realities of living with dementia and Alzheimer's Disease. Its goal is to help foster meaningful interaction and reduce unnecessary suffering among patients, caregivers, and their families.

The production has been generously supported by Kenneth G. Murray and the Murray Alzheimer Research and Education Program in the Faculty of Applied Health Sciences at the University of Waterloo; the Sunnybrook and Women's Research Institute; and the Canadian Nurses Foundation.

I will be playing one of the six characters in the play. There are 3 actors who play each role. We perform all over the province, so it is good to have several people who can play the same role. Of course, the other two women who play the same role understood that I would want to perform at our church! I hope many parishioners can attend. There will be flyers available that you can send out to friends to invite them by e-mail or deliver in person.

One special aspect of our performances is that there is a representative from the Alzheimer's Society who is present to answer questions during the talkback that takes place after the performance. The talkback is a very meaningful experience for all who are present.

I first saw this play when it was performed at St. James Cathedral 10 years ago. It struck me as something I wished I had seen earlier. I hope you will be able to come.
