Priest Dear friends in Christ, during Lent we have been preparing for the celebration of our

Today we greet him as our King, although we know his crown is thorns and his throne a cross. We follow

him this week from the glory of the palms to the glory of the resurrection by way of the dark road of suffering and death. United with him in his suffering on the cross, may we share his resurrection and new life. Let us pray. Assist us mercifully with your help, Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy into the celebration of those mighty acts whereby you give us eternal life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?" just say this, "The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately." 'They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, 'What are you doing, untying the colt?' They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, 'Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!' Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.




Hosanna in the highest.

Celebrant We give thanks to you, Lord our God, for the goodness and love you have made known to us in creation; in calling Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Saviour and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life. On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, a death he freely accepted, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: this is my body which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." 

Hymn Notes for Hymn 185 – Sing, My Tongue, the Glorious Battle

Venantius Honorius Clementianus Fortunatus (c.540-c.600) was the chief Latin poet of his age. Cured of blindness by a miracle, he made a pilgrimage to the tomb of St. Martin of Tours in 565. He settled in Poitiers, became a priest, and was made Bishop of Poitiers in 599. Fortunatus wrote this hymn and its companion hymn, *The Royal Banners Forward Go* (Hymnal #186), for a procession on November 19, 569: the Relics of the Cross, which had been brought from the East, were taken from Tours to Poitiers. In 1263, Thomas Aquinas used *Sing, My Tongue* as the model for his hymn, *Now, My Tongue*, the Mystery Telling (Hymnal #50 & 51). Sing, My Tongue is a song of triumph for the victory of Christ over evil. The reference to the Cross in verse 4 contains an allusion to the legend that traced the wood of the Cross back through history to the Tree of Life in the Garden of Eden. The translator of this hymn is the English hymnodist Percy Dearmer (1867-1936). He was the vicar of St. Mary's, Primrose Hill, in London (1901-15). A chaplain to the British forces in World War I, he later became professor of ecclesiastical art at King's College, London. Along with Ralph Vaughan Williams, Dearmer was a guiding genius in the production of *The English Hymnal* (1906).
