Reader The first lesson is written in the twenty-first chapter of the Book of Numbers, beginning at the 4th verse..

From Mount Hor they set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.

Reader The second lesson is written in the second chapter of the Epistle of St Paul to the Ephesians, beginning at the first verse.

You were dead through the trespasses and sins in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ - by grace you have been saved - and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God - not the result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

Third Lesson John 3.14-21

Reader The third lesson is written in the third chapter of the Gospel According to St John, beginning at he fourteenth verse.

Jesus said, "Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. And this is the judgement, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

Hymn Notes #486 – Love Divine, All Loves Excelling

Charles Wesley (1707-1788) was the son of a clergyman and the brother of John Wesley, the founder of Methodism. Charles received his M.A. from Oxford in 1733. At Oxford, he was one of the young Oxonians who were known as "Methodists" because of their methodical method of observing Christian life and ritual. He was ordained in the Church of England in 1735. Beginning in 1738, Charles became an itinerant preacher and evangelist in association with John. After 1856, Charles settled first in Bristol and then in London. Unlike his brother, Charles remained loyal to the Anglican Church. Charles wrote 6500 hymns and could be described as the great hymn writer of all ages. This hymn, published in 1747, ranks as one of his best.

The tune *Hyfrydol* (which means "good cheer" in Welsh) was written by Rowland Hugh Pritchard (1811-1887). He published it in a book of his tunes in 1844.

Hymn Notes #**506** – *Lord of All Hopefulness*

Jan Struther (1901-1953) was born in London. As early as 1917, she was contributing articles, short stories, and poems to English periodicals. Her most famous work is *Mrs. Miniver* (1939), a novel chronicling the life of an English housewife just prior to World War II. During the war, Struther moved to New York where she died in 1953. This hymn, published in 1931, is considered to be one of the finest of the so-called "all-day" hymns because it portrays the cycle of life as well as the cycle of the day. It is a lovely hymn which fits together thought, word, and music. *Slane* is an old Irish folk tune named for the hill near Tara in Ireland where St. Patrick is said to have lit his Easter Even fire. The tune was harmonized in 1927 to accompany the old hymn *Be Thou My Vision*. Struther wrote *Lord of All Hopefulness* specifically to be sung to *Slane*.
