Reader The first lesson is written in the third chapter of the Acts of the Apostles, beginning at the 12th verse.



Third Lesson Luke 24.36b-48

Read by the Reverend Canon Michael Burgess

Reader The third lesson is written in the twenty-fourth chapter of the Gospel according to St Luke, beginning at the thirty-sixth verse.

Jesus himself stood among the disciples and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of broiled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you - that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

Hymn Notes #215 - Come, ye Faithful, Raise the Strain

St. John of Damascus (c.696-780) was the last of the Greek Church Fathers. The greatest poet of the Greek Church, he received the title "Chrysorrhous" (Stream of Gold) for his poetic gifts. An important official in Damascus, John sold his possessions and entered a monastery near Jerusalem. He wrote Canons for the great festivals of the Christian year. This hymn, the first ode of the Canon for Morning Prayer on Low Sunday, is based on the "Song of Moses" (Exodus 15:1-18). John Mason Neale (1818-66), the most learned hymnologist of his time, is best known for his translations of Latin and Greek hymns. He believed that hymns should be the common property of Christianity. Thus he did not copyright his hymns and translations. His translation of this hymn was published in 1850, and it was included in the Appendix to *Hymns Ancient & Modern* (1868). *Gaudeamus Pariter* was written by Johann Horn (c.1490-1547) who became the leading bishop of the Bohemian Brethren in 1532. He helped write the doctrine of the Brotherhood in 20 articles and edited the 1544 edition of the Brethren's German hymnal, which included this tune. It was later included in a German Catholic hymnbook (1584) to accompany a Marienlied (*Ave Virgo Virginum*).
