First Lesson 1 Kings 2:10–12,3:3–14

Read by Barbara Pearson

A Reading from the First Book of Kings.

David slept with his ancestors, and was buried in the city of David. The time that David reigned over Israel was forty years; he reigned for seven years in Hebron, and thirty-three years in Jerusalem. So Solomon sat on the throne of his father David; and his kingdom was firmly established. Solomon loved the Lord, walking in the statutes of his father David; only, he sacrificed and offered incense at the high places. The king went to Gibeon to sacrifice there, for that was the principal high place; Solomon used to offer a thousand burnt-offerings on that altar. At Gibeon the Lord appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, 'Ask what I should give you.' And Solomon said, 'You have shown great and steadfast love

to your servant my father David, because he walked before you in faithfulness, in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart towards you; and you have kept for him this great and steadfast love, and have given him a son to sit on his throne today. And now, O Lord my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, able to discern between good and evil; for who can govern this your great people?' It pleased the Lord that Solomon had asked this. 11 God said to him, 'Because you have asked this, and have not asked for yourself long life or riches, or for the life of your enemies, but have asked for yourself understanding to discern what is right, I now do according to your word. Indeed I give you a wise and discerning mind; no one like you has been before you and no one like you shall arise after you. I give you also what you have not asked, both riches and honour all your life; no other king shall compare with you. If you will walk in my ways, keeping my statutes and my commandments, as your father David walked, then I will lengthen your life.'

- Intinction (dipping the bread into the chalice of wine) is not permitted in the Anglican Diocese of Toronto.

Hymn Note for Let All the World in Every Corner Sing (CP # 357)

George Herbert (1593-1633) was one of the greatest English poets of the 17th Century. He graduated from Trinity College, Cambridge, and served as the public orator of the university (1619-27). James I called him "the jewel of the university." He was ordained in 1626 and served as a parish priest until his death from consumption. His most famous work is *The Temple* (published posthumously in 1633). It is a three-part work which denotes his relationship with God. His poetry was widely read in the 17th century, and leading Puritans had a marked devotion to his works. Herbert described his poems as "a picture of spiritual conflicts that have passed betwixt God and my soul."

Basil Harwood (1858-1949) graduated from Trinity College, Oxford (D. Mus.,1890), and he was organist at Trinity College, Elly Cathedral and Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford. After 1909, he devoted himself to composing. He was editor of the *Oxford Hymn Book* (1908). He *wrote Luckington* (named for a village in Wiltshire) to accompany Herbert's words (1908).
