THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

Reader A reading from the Book of Proverbs.

A capable wife who can find? She is far more precious than jewels. The heart of her husband trusts in her, and he will have no lack of gain. She does him good, and not harm,

all the days of her life. She seeks wool and flax, and works with willing hands. She is like the ships of the merchant, she brings her food from far away. She rises while it is still night and provides food for her household and tasks for her servant-girls. She considers a field and buys it; with the fruit of her hands she plants a vineyard. She girds herself with strength, and makes her arms strong. She perceives that her merchandise is profitable. Her lamp does not go out at night. She puts her hands to the distaff, and her hands hold the spindle. She opens her hand to the poor, and reaches out her hands to the needy. She is not afraid for her household when it snows, for all her household are clothed in crimson. She makes herself coverings; her clothing is fine linen and purple. Her husband is known in the city gates, taking his seat among the elders of the land. She makes linen garments and sells them; she supplies the merchant with sashes. Strength and dignity are her clothing, and she laughs at the time to come. She opens her mouth with wisdom, and the teaching of kindness is on her tongue. She looks well to the ways of her household, and does not eat the bread of idleness. Her children rise up and call her happy; her husband too, and he praises her: 'Many women have done excellently, but you surpass them all.' Charm is deceitful, and beauty is vain, but a woman who fears the Lord is to be praised. Give her a share in the fruit of her hands, and let her works praise her in the city gates.

Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be boastful and false to the truth. Such wisdom does not come down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for those who make peace. Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they not come from your cravings that are at war within you? You want something and do not have it; so you commit murder. And you covet something and cannot obtain it; so you engage in disputes and conflicts. You do not have, because you do not ask. You ask and do not receive, because you ask wrongly, in order to spend what you get on your pleasures. Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw near to God, and he will draw near to you.

HOLY COMMUNION

- Holy Communion is administered at the High Altar and a standing station at the St. Peter's
 Altar in the south aisle. If you do not wish to receive communion, you may come forward for
 a blessing. Fold your hands over your chest to indicate this to the administering priest. Please
 follow the directions of the sides-people.
- You may choose to receive the bread only where the fullness of the sacrament is present. If
 you do not wish to drink from the common cup, simply receive the bread and return to your
 seat. You may also touch the base of the chalice while the words of administration are said.
- Intinction (dipping the bread into the chalice of wine) is not permitted in the Anglican Diocese of Toronto.
- During Communion *Anointing for Healing* will be administered in the north and south aisles of the Church.

Hymn Notes: There's a Wideness in God's Mercy (CP # 606)

Yorkshire-born Frederick William Faber (1814-1863) was raised a strict Calvinist. Then, while studying at Oxford, he came under the influence of John Henry Newman. After graduation, Faber was ordained an Anglican priest (1839). In 1846, he converted to Catholicism. He founded a religious community in Birmingham which merged in 1848 with the Oratory of St. Philip Neri. Until 1863, Faber headed the London branch, which became the Brompton Oratory. He was greatly influenced by the hymns of Newman, Cowper, and the Wesleys. His passion was to provide English Catholics with a body of hymns equal to *Olney Hymns*. Faber wrote 150 hymns and published several hymn books between '849 and 1862. This hymn was published in 1854 and was expanded to 13 stanzas in 1862. Our hymn book contains five of the stanzas beginning with the original stanza four.

Faber's hymn has been associated with no less than 23 hymn tunes. *Gott Will's Machen*, published in 1735, was written by Johann Ludwig Steiner, who was a town musician in Zurich.
